The survey is open to all stakeholders including Parents / Pupils / Staff and the wider community.

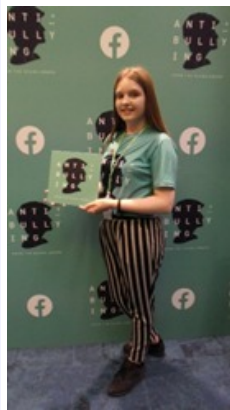

Scunthorpe and Clamart, France has been twinned since 1976.. In 1982 a junior rugby team made their first visit. This year the exchange celebrated its 36th year. Our team travelled to Clamart on the 10th May and were hosted by the Clamart team's families. They visited the Eiffel Tower and Acr d'Triomphe, completing the trip with a rugby tournament on the Sunday. The team from Clamart arrived in Winterton on Good Friday to a host of activities including paint balling and bowling. There was a rugby tournament at Heslam Park followed by a hog roast which was attended by the Mayor of Scunthorpe.



Charlie Bonner our Year 7 student was part of the Scunthorpe team. Charlie started playing rugby for Scunthorpe U12's in September 2018, he has represented the town every week since.

The team has had this opportunity for the French exchange which has seen the boys host children from Clamart and then in return they have gone to live with the French children and their families. During this period the boys have played in tournaments both here and in France having the opportunity to play against some fantastic French teams.

In 2020 the lads are hoping to gain a place playing in a huge week long tournament in Portugal, against teams from around the world including South Africa, New Zealand and Australia.

She plays club cricket for Haltemprice CC and Market Rasen CC Ladies teams and represented Haltemprice CC in the Vitality National ECB Womens T20 Competition Finals held in Newport, Wales last month.

A medium paced swing bowler, Becca is this year's leading wicket taker for Lincolnshire Under 15 Girls and the only Under 15 girl cricketer to have taken two 5 wicket hauls whilst representing the County. Her batting continues to improve and has seen her move up the order this year, hopefully to achieve 'all-rounder' status for the team.

She jumped at the opportunity to join the 2019 Lincolnshire Tour of Dubai and Sri Lanka and thoroughly enjoyed the whole cultural and cricketing experience. She will play for Lincolnshire U17 Girls next year and hopes to continue playing County Cricket well into the future.

Beth Hall, Year 8, has been swimming competitively for just over 4 years now. She started swimming for Scunthorpe anchor in 2015, then in 2017 she moved to Grimsby Aquatics. This means a lot of out of school hours are spent either travelling to and from swimming, swim training in the pool and swim training in the gym. 10-12 hours a week are in the pool and 2 hours are gym/weight training based. During the summer months she swims in open water once a week as her swimming club also enters open water events.

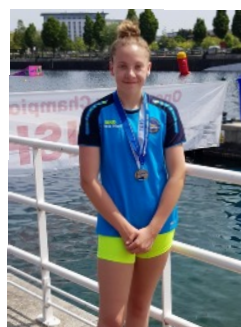


Her first big success in the pool came in 2016 when she won 6 Yorkshire county medals. Since then she has won over 20 county medals in various strokes and distances. In 2017 and 2018 she qualified for the North East regional events and earlier this year won her first regional medal.

2019 has been a breakthrough year for Beth, after training hard all season, not just in the pool but also out of the pool and being focused on nutrition and the correct type of rest, she has achieved goal to make it to the English nationals. Expecting maybe 1 or 2 events she has gone beyond expectations and made it into 5

different events. But to top this off she got a

very unexpected British national time and will also be competing at the British championships this year.



Last weekend Beth travelled to Manchester to swim in the regional open water championships and won a silver medal, now qualifying for the national open water champs.

So when school closes for the summer, Beth will be travelling to Glasgow to compete in the British champs, then she will head back home for a couple of days before spending 4 days competing at the English nationals at Ponds Forge, into a very quick turn around and travelling to the open water 3k national finals.

Robyn Byrne, Year 7, competed all weekend for Forces Equine representing North Lincolnshire Council as a dependent. Robyn won 2 classes and came 3rd in another. It was 2 very long days. As

always Robyn helped out and she was in charge of the raffle which was supporting the Fire Benevolent Fund.

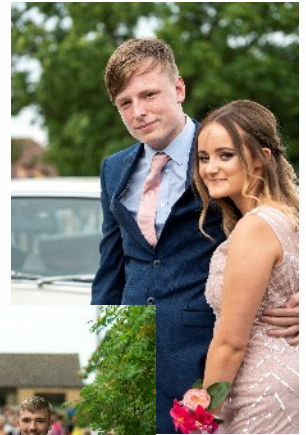
She raised over £370 in 2 days. Robyn won lots of prizes and £100. We thank the school for allowing her

Normanby Camp

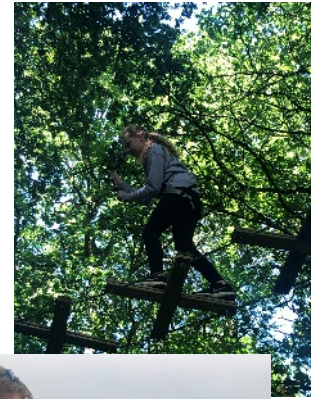

What advice would you like to give to students of Winterton Community Academy?

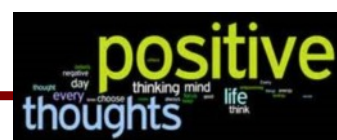

Strawberry & vanilla shortcakes

Ingredients

Makes: 8 shortcakes

For the Shortcakes

325 grams plain flour

½ teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon baking powder

5 tablespoons caster sugar

125 grams unsalted butter (frozen)

1 large egg (beaten)

125 millilitres single cream

1 large egg white (lightly beaten)

For the Filling

approx. 300 grams strawberries

1 tablespoon caster sugar

3 drops balsamic vinegar (optional)

250 millilitres double cream (or creme fraiche)

Method

Preheat the oven to 220°C/200°C Fan/gas mark 7/425°F.

Mix the flour, salt, baking powder and 3 tablespoons of the sugar in a bowl. Grate the butter into these dry ingredients and use your fingertips to finish crumbling the butter into the flour.

Whisk the egg into the cream, and pour into the flour mixture a little at a time, using a fork to mix. You may not need all of the egg cream to make the dough come together, so go cautiously.

Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface, and roll gently to a thickness of about 2cm / ¾ inch. Dip a 6½ cm / 2½ inch round cutter in flour and cut out as many rounds as you can. Work the scraps back into a dough, re-roll and finish cutting out you should get 8 in all.

Place the shortcakes about 2½ cm / 1 inch apart on a greased or lined baking sheet, brush the tops with the egg white, and sprinkle them with the remaining 2 tablespoons of caster sugar.

Bake for 10-15 minutes, until golden-brown, and let them cool for a short while on a wire rack. Meanwhile, crush half the strawberries with the spoonful of sugar and the few drops of balsamic vinegar if using, and halve or quarter the remaining strawberries, depending on their size. Whip the double cream, if you're using.

The shortcakes should be eaten while still warm, so split each one across the middle and cover with a spoonful of the crushed strawberry mixture, a few halved or quartered strawberries, then dollop some whipped cream or creme fraiche on top, and set the top back on.



JABS FOR THE BOYS:

The case for gender-neutral HPV vaccination

The vaccination team will soon be offering the HPV vaccination to year 8 boys from September. This is great news for boys aged between 12 and 13 in England. Year 8 boys will be offered a vaccine to protect them against HPV-related cancers. The HPV vaccination is a 2 dose vaccination given a year apart, therefore boys receiving the vaccination in 2020 will require a 2nd dose a year later. The vaccination will be given in school alongside the HPV vaccination for girls which is currently part of the national childhood immunisation schedule.

The extension of the vaccine to boys follows the success of England's HPV vaccination schedule for girls aged 12 and 13. The schedule is expected to vaccinate thousands of boys in England each year.

HPV Vaccine Facts

for boys and girls

Every year 26,800 women and men in the U.S. develop HPV-related cancer.

The newest HPV vaccine protects against 9 HPV types and 6 kinds of cancer.

90% of genital warts, 74% of all HPV cancers, and 81% of cervical cancers are prevented by the vaccine.

In the U.S., 79 million are currently infected with HPV. Half of all new infections are in boys and girls aged 15-24.

Up to 80% of sexually active individuals have had HPV. Safer sex practices like condoms and monogamy do not fully protect against HPV.

11-12 years is the optimal age for the vaccine because antibody production is highest, and it should be given long before any sexual contact to be most protective.

a lovely way for our new parents to get to know us and each other. We look forward to holding many future fundraising events together.

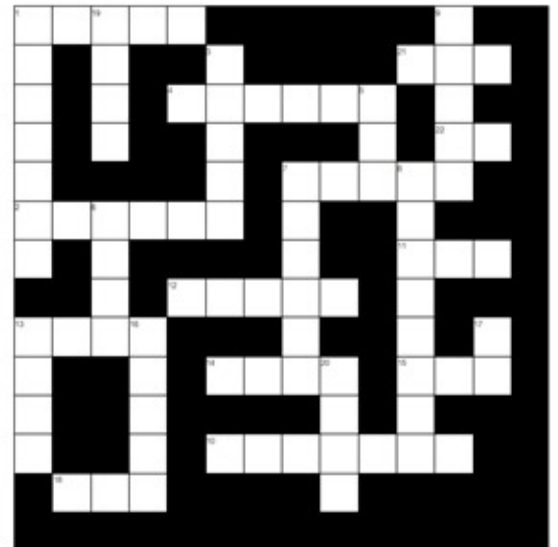
