We have this year also seen huge improvements in our school attendance, with our overall attendance tracking significantly above local and national averages. I would like to thank you for your support in helping us to achieve this. Attendance does make a difference, with a direct correlation between school attendance and achievement outcomes. We remain committed to supporting those children and young people who do not have good attendance and it continues to be one of our priorities as we move into the next academic year.

There are a number of staff leaving us at the end of term. This is not unusual or unexpected in the sense that as a school we invest specifically in working with Teach First as a teacher training provider. This means that we often recruit teachers at the start of their career and support their training and development. The minimum term for this program is two-years however, often, our staff stay for longer. A benefit to this program is that we attract staff from a wider geographic region and they commit to working in North Lincs for at least the duration of their training. It does however mean that thereafter, there is a possibility that they will leave the region and continue their career elsewhere in the UK. I would like to thank the staff that are leaving for all of their hard-work and wish them well for the future

## Duke of Edinburgh Award



HRH Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh first considered the idea of a national programme to support young people's development in the autumn of 1954 at the request of his inspiring former headmaster, Kurt Hahn.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for boys started in 1956. The programme was made up of rescue and public service, expedition, pursuits and projects and fitness. In 1957 The Duke of Edinburgh's Award for girls is piloted. The programme consisted of design for living, adventure and interests and service.

The DofE launched a new five year strategy in 2021, aiming to give more than one million young people the chance to participate in our life-changing programmes, over the next five years.

In 2023 His Majesty The King conferred the Dukedom of Edinburgh upon Prince Edward who as the new Duke of Edinburgh, took on the patronage held by his father, Prince Philip, to ensure his legacy lives on through our life-changing work.

A goup of our year 9/10 students have enrolled in the award this year .Having completed their Physical, Skill and Volunteering sections of their award. The students have worked hard to plan their routes ready for their Expedition. They practiced pitching their tents and outdoor cooking in readiness for their planned walk from Horkstow to Normanby cricket ground, where they prepared their evening meal and camped for the night. (All of the groups were remotely supervised by staff whilst out walking.)


#### Snowdonia

Junior Mathematical Challenge 2023

Some of our students took part in the recent UK Mathematics Challenge.

This challenge is a national competition putting the strongest young mathematicians against each other. During this challenge students are asked to solve contextualised problems. Some of which require maths up to and including the year 8 curriculum. This means that some of the problems required a level of mathematics that has not yet been studied.

This challenge is highly competitive across the country with only 50% of students that compete get recognised with a bronze, silver or gold certificate. Each of these levels become increasingly difficult to progress into.

This is an incredible achievement that is only enhanced by the fact they have sat this challenge a whole year early. This is proof of their hard work, positivity and respect shown within their maths lessons and wider school.

#### Year 6 Transition Days




block bots -students made characters from wooden blocks in design technology





Year 6 transition saw the pupils from our feeder academies taking on challenges in Science.

Firstly they looked at some prepared slides of flies and moths, then they were asked to make their own slide of onion cells and draw what they saw.





Then they were asked to

measure out exactly 137ml of water, harder than it looks the closest was 136.9ml!

One of the last challenges was Zombie Apocalypse. Pupils had to design shoe covers using various materials that allowed them to move silently over a variety of surfaces, to avoid zombie detection! If students can find a way to make their footsteps as silent as possible over a range of different surfaces such as bottles tops they will be able to safely roam outside of their base. They've learned that a zombie's hearing isn't as good as a human's hearing.



## **Open Water Safety Tips**



The benefits of swimming and dipping in open water are well documented. Not only does being in or on open water allow new adventure it also has documented benefits for both physical and mental wellbeing. All of these hazards can be controlled through proper organisation and planning.

Around 85% of accidental drownings occur at open water sites. Many of these drownings occur due to a lack of knowledge and understanding of open water safety.

Risks to consider in open water include:

The shock of cold water can make swimming difficult and increase the difficulty in getting out of the water Lack of safety equipment and increased difficulty for rescue The height of the fall or jump if tombstoning The depth of the water – this changes and is unpredictable Underwater objects and hazards may not be visible Obstacles or other people in the water Strong currents can rapidly sweep people away equipment

Uneven banks and river beds

Water quality, e.g. toxic algal blooms and industrial/ agricultural pollution

Experience the joys of open water swimming safely.

3.6m people took part in open water swimming in the last year, with 606,800 open water swimming in the last month, an increase of 48% on 2020/21. Source: Active Lives Data (2021/22).

Here are our top tips to enjoy water safely whilst swimming outdoors

Plan your day

Think about the water temperature and weather

Plan your exit before you get into the water. Consider any

currents, the tidal flow and wind direction

Use a recognised venue, preferably lifeguarded

Research the area – make sure it is safe and you know where to get in and out of the water

Take time to read the warning and guidance signs and research location advice

Have the right equipment

Wetsuits aid exposure to cold water

Wear a brightly coloured swimming hat

Take a Tow float

Warm dry clothes ready – dryrobes are widely used by open water swimmers Warm drink

Always wear a buoyancy aid or lifejacket for activities on the water or at the water's edge Take something to refuel

Take a buddy with you Swim with a friend or open water swimming group, it's more fun and they can help in an emergency Tell someone else where you are going and how long you expect to be



#### Know your limits

Reduce the impact of cold water shock, acclimatise in the home environment and enter the water slowly Unless you are a competent open water swimmer, used to swimming in a particular environment, you should swim under the supervision of lifeguards Swim parallel to the shoreline, wherever possible stay away from deeper water, which will be colder Plan and be aware of your exit points Avoid drifting in the currents Know how to stay safe and get help If you get into trouble or feel overwhelmed – Float to Live Fight your instinct to thrash around Lean back Catch your breath Now think about getting out Familarise yourself with any rescue support or public rescue

If someone is in difficulty in the water

Shout reassurance to them and shout for help, and ensure the emergency services are on their way (call 999 or 112) Without endangering yourself, see if you can reach out to them, extend your reach with a stick, pole, or item of clothing, lie down or stay secure Alternatively, throw something buoyant to them such as a ring buoy, part-filled plastic container, ball, or anything that will float

Keep your eye on them all the time and shout reassurance, urging them to propel themselves to safety Do not enter the water yourself
