September 2023 saw the launch of our Leadership Academy in Years 7 and 8. The academy mirrors the Duke of Edinburgh programme that was so successful last year and is undertaken by our Year 9 students.

The day walk for Year 7 took place earlier this month with students walking in terrible conditions across the Humber Bridge and back. After which they cooked their own tea and played board games.






Year 7 have now completed all aspects of their programme and were awarded certificates in our rewards assembly.

GCSE Geography



In September our Year 11 GCSE Geography students visited Louth to complete their GCSE Geography Fieldwork data collection. Students completed a variety of data collection tasks to investigate how the River Ludd changes downstream and investigated the impact of tourism and urban decline in the town centre of Louth. The weather was not particularly kind to those visiting on the Tuesday, those visiting on the Friday were much more fortunate!





A spelling bee is a competition in which contestants are asked to spell a broad selection of words, usually with a varying degree of difficulty. To compete, contestants must memorize the spellings of words as written in dictionaries, and recite them accordingly.

In this term's Spelling Bee Year 7 (7A) were the overall KS3 winners. This is the first time that a year 7 group has won since the spelling bee began. Well Done!



Year 11 Visit to Thackray Medical Museum

Our Y11 Historians visited the Thackray Medical Museum on Friday 1st December. Students explored the grimy streets of Victorian Leeds, experienced the smells, sounds and scenes displaying the realities of public health during the 19th Century. We also watched gruesome operations taking place in the 19th-century operating theatre and discovered the medical innovations that changed the world.

The Y11 students attended an interactive workshop on the history of surgery looking at key problems that surgeons of the past faced. The interactive workshop took place in an authentic Victorian operating theatre so students could soak up some of the atmosphere, as well as be transported back in time by some Victorian Hospital smells. Experiences of surgery without anaesthetics were considered and discussions of how the development of painkillers helped revolutionise attitudes of patients and improve outcomes. The issue of infection was explained, and the work of key individuals such as Joseph Lister debated as well as other key figures in the beginning of the 20th century who enabled blood transfusion to occur and be less risky.

The Y11 students behaved exceptionally well and we were so proud to take the students to Leeds for the day. Well done!



Careers Fair

In October students in Year 9 – Year 11 were invited to attend our careers event. This was an opportunity to meet with local colleges, employers and Higher Education providers in order to find out more about post 16 education. More that 25 providers attended and engaged with our students.


